

## Susan B. Anthony's Enduring Themes

<b>Beliefs and Ideals</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Susan B. Anthony believed that men and women were equal</li><li>• She believed that women should be able to vote</li></ul>	<b>Conflict and Change</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Women had no voting rights</li><li>• Finally in 1920 the law was changed and women had the right to vote. This law became the 19<sup>th</sup> amendment to the Constitution.</li></ul>	<b>Distribution of Power</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Women could not vote in elections</li><li>• Few women attended college</li><li>• Few jobs open to women</li></ul>
<b>Actions of Individuals, Groups, and Institutions</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Formed women's groups to spread the word about equality for all</li><li>• Worked collaboratively with Elizabeth Cady Stanton</li></ul>	<b>How is this location significant?</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Born in Massachusetts to a Quaker family who were activists and part of the anti-slavery movement.</li></ul>	<b>Economics</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Women could not own property</li><li>• Women were paid less than men for doing the same job</li><li>• Women had to give the money they earned to their husbands</li></ul>
